Mother's Day will be at Red Poles on Sunday, May 8. If you haven't booked somewhere already then maybe think about Red Poles, who will be doing a three-course lunch with a choice of four different mains and a glass of bubbly for \$45 a head.

Live music will feature the wonderful skills of musicians The Yearlings from 12.30pm.

The eclectic mix of art means you are sure to find that special present too.

The art gallery features the exhibition titled 'With Love' and showcases artists Hannah Carlyle and Zoe Brooks and is a collaboration between paint and jewellery intertwined to spell out a macabre perception of a contemporary romance.

Micro scenarios encountering seduction, subjectification and a subtle innocence become an insight into the relationships we come across.

Both are emerging artists from the Helpmann Academy and Hannah is also represented at the Jam Factory.

Winery of the month is Fox Creek Wines - a family owned company established by Jim and Helen Watts in 1984.

You can enjoy their Shadows Run Sauvignon Blanc, the Red Baron Shiraz and the Fox Creek Shiraz Grenache Mourvedre at Red Poles or visit their 19th century stone cellar door cottage set amidst beautiful cottage gardens.

Red Poles also has a wonderful selection of McLaren Vale wines on its new wine list and some of the latest additions include the Coriole Fiano, Pertaringa Bonfire Block Semillion, Alpha Box and Dice Golden Mullet Fury, Hugh Hamilton The Villain, Kay Brothers Amery Basket Pressed Merlot, Alpha Box and Dice Tarot Grenache, Beach Road Primitivo and Ulithorne Paternus Cabernet Shiraz. Live music continues every Sunday afternoon from 12.30 to 3.30pm.

This month's musicians include Esther Lamb, The Yearlings, Cal Williams jr, Jeff Deboar, Liz Tobias and The Baker Suite.

The next cabaret will be on Saturday, May 28

and will feature West African rhythms by Ziggi and Karamba with their soaring melodies featuring the emotively beautiful sounds of the kora.

In the tradition of the griot, Ziggi and Karamba offer songs that express praise, promote unity and give insight into the rich cultural heritage of Senegal.

The second half of the evening features Victoriana Gaye - sometimes whimsical, sometimes romantic and sometimes rockin'.

They describe their sound as a quirky combination of pop, folk and a tiny bit of grunge.

Playing a mix of acoustic and electric guitars, trumpet, ukulele, harmonica and sweet harmonies, Vicki Gaye and Jeff Raglus will

thoroughly entertain you.

Bookings are essential and for only \$59 a head you will enjoy a three-course dinner and the show.

The Bank SA Sea and Vines festival is also fast approaching and the brochure is available at venues and the Visitor Centre and many other locations.

Red Poles and Pertaringa Wines will partner together to offer a night of fine food, wine and entertainment in the relaxed atmosphere of Red Poles on Saturday June 11.

This is a perfect opportunity to arrive early for the sea and vines festivities and kick back before the party begins on the Sunday.

Red Poles head chef Nat Wilson has designed a menu with a focus on Fleurieu produce and will be matched with new and museum releases of Pertaringa wines.

Live music by The Yearlings will be entwined with banter by the Pertaringa vigneron and winemaker on the food and wine matchings. The event is limited so book early.

Tables of eight are highly recommended at \$90 per person, or \$99 per person for individual bookings so phone Red Poles on 8323 8994.

On Sunday, June 12 and Monday, June 13 Red Poles will be open as normal with live music by TeaHouse Fire on Sunday and Kylie Wilson on Monday with the usual a la carte menu. Bookings would be appreciated but not essential.

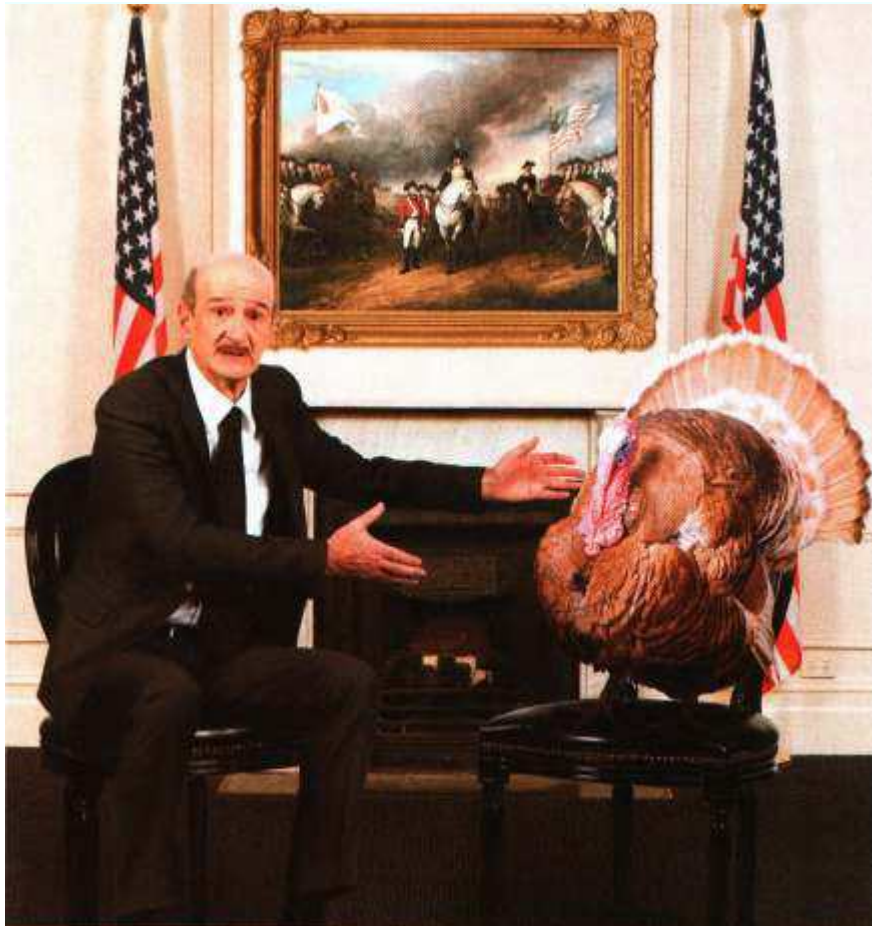
