Describing herself as a designer/maker Elliss is known for designing and making thoughtful, original furniture and lighting, that utilising the support and skills of local craft practitioner and manufacturers. Her appreciation for Scandinavian design, is made apparent in her minimalist aesthetic.

Having worked closely with a number of Australian brands including Koskela, Estilo Commercial and Wodmark, to sustain her Australian made ethos, Elliss has expanded her practice to include residential and hospitality fit outs. Elliss is a Studio Educator in Product Design and Workshop Instructor at the School of Art, Architecture and Design, University of South Australia.

Takeshi lue is a furniture maker and product designer. He was an Associate in the JamFactory Furniture Studio in 2006 - 07, after gaining a Diploma of Art (Furniture Design) at TAFE SA, and Bachelor of Visual Communications (Graphic Design) from the University of South Australia.

With simplicity as a guiding principal, lue creates pared-back designs that contradict the complexity of their construction. Working from sketches, models and prototypes, each of his designs undergoes an exacting series of iterations. Slowly refining angles, shape and shadow lines, his thoughtfulness allows him to create sophisticated, timeless furniture.

In 2009 leading South Australian furniture designer Khai Liew invited lue to join his team of talented cabinet-makers. With a shared passion for a minimalist aesthetic and attention to detail, working for Liew has enabled lue to further hone his skills as maker of furniture of a refined beauty.

Peter Walker was a graduate from the ground-breaking Design in Wood program at the University of Tasmania in Hobart in the mid-1980s. Having established a successful practice as a designer–maker, combining sculptural work and functional design, he moved to Adelaide in 1997 to take up the role of Head of Furniture Design.

Walker's successes resulted in his appointment as Honorary Research Fellow at the University of Wisconsin and later to the prestigious Rhode Island School of Design. During his ten years at RISD as Associate Professor, serving the roles of Graduate Research Director and Department Head of Furniture Design, Walker established Walker Surfboards in Adelaide, where he designs and builds environmentally conscious, hollow wooden surfboards. His professional practice and by association, his teaching holds deep connections to nature in material, form, use, and its relationship to the body.

Walker is currently Program Director: Master of Design School of Art, Architecture and Design, University of South Australia.
